**Further Regulations pertaining to a particular
Sections listed with that section.**

All exhibits must be the bona-fide property of the exhibitor.

All farm produce and horticultural exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor and be of this season's crop.

The Society reserves the right to refuse entry to any animal where there is reason to believe it is either diseased or dangerous. Intending competitors are requested to observe the time fixed for closing of entries. Please read the notes with each section carefully. **NO entry** will be accepted without the appropriate entry fee, and completed entry form.

All competitors and patrons enter the showground at their own risk. The showground are inspected regularly by the Society's Safety Officer and every care has been taken to remove any potential hazards.

Every possible care will be taken of exhibits but no responsibility will be incurred by the Society. The Society shall not, under any circumstances, hold itself responsible for any loss by theft, fire, storm damage by water, flood or lightning. Exhibits and displays shall be accepted only on this condition. Security precautions will be taken to safeguard exhibits in the Pavilion during Sunday and Monday nights.

The Society shall not be reasonable for any accident that may be caused through or by an exhibit. It shall be a condition of entry that each exhibitor shall not hold the Society responsible and indemnify against it any legal proceedings arising from such accident.

All persons exhibiting shall accept the decision of the Judges appointed by the Society. In the case of protest against awards, such protest must be in writing and Lodged with the Secretary before 3pm on Monday, with \$50 deposit, to be forfeited on the event of the protest proving frivolous. The decision of the Society Committee shall be final and without appeal.

2. Entrants must be residents of Australia, 13 years and under 17 years inclusive, on the day of the local show, and prepared to attend 2024 Group final.
3. Entrant will be required to wear an outfit suitable for attending a country show (even if judging is an evening function). No hats and no changing garments is permitted for presentations at Group judging.
4. Awards will be presented to "Show Teenager" and the runner-up. A third prize will be presented if six or more entrants are at the Group final.
5. The winning selection(s) shall be final and binding to the entries.

Aims of Rural Ambassador Awards-

To highlight the talent, creativity and ingenuity of young rural people and in doing so, encourage entrants to be role models in their local community.

Rules & Regulations - Rural Ambassador Award

- Open to ambassadors aged between 20 and 30 years as of the 1st May 2024 and the finalist must reside in Victoria.

- Each Show can run a Rural Ambassador Show qualifier and the winner at Show Level then represents the Show at the Group Final.
- An ambassador having won at their local Show Level is not eligible to enter any other Show or represent another group.
- A maximum of 12 finalists will be eligible for the State Final with preference to all Group Final winners and each runner up of each group will be considered. If numbers exceed 12 finalist's interviews will be held at the information day to determine the remaining State Finalists.
- The State Final is held at the Royal Melbourne Show and each finalist is judged based on the criteria below.
- Each Finalist will need to supply a resume with a cover letter and a draft/ copy of speech for the State Final, which will be given to the judges of the State Final.
- Each Finalist will be interviewed by a panel of three judges and the State Finalist will need to present at speech at the presentation luncheon. The winner will be announced at the presentation luncheon.

Judging Criteria

- Local Show Involvement (25 Points) – Entrants must demonstrate an active involvement and a desire to be involved in the future and improvement of their Local Show Society.
- Community Involvement (15 Points) - Entrants must demonstrate an active involvement and a desire to be involved in the future and improvement of their Local Community.
- General and Rural Knowledge (20 Points) – Entrants must demonstrate a broad general knowledge and an awareness of Local/National Community issues. Entrant must also have an understanding of current affairs relating to rural life and industry.
- Personality (10 Points) – Personality Traits consistent with both the awards and the entrant's ambitions and goals will be assessed (e.g. enthusiasm, creativity, confidence, leadership).
- Ambitions/Goals (10 Points) - Each Entrant's ambitions and goals will be assessed on their integrity and relevance to the awards. Entrants must demonstrate steps towards achieving their goal.
- Communication Skills (10 Points) – Entrants are expected to demonstrate effective communication skills – written, oral and interpersonal.
- Presentation and Grooming (10 Points) – Entrant's presentation will be assessed according to the suitability of their attire and conduct in a range of contexts.
- Public Presentation (3-minute speech) (20 Points) – Entrant's public presentation will be assessed according to the quality of the content, delivery and the extent to which it addresses the set topic.

- Runner Up: \$1500.00 Prizemoney

Rules & Regulations - Junior Show Ambassador

- Open to ambassadors aged between 16 and 19 years on the day of their Local Show.
- Each Show can run a Junior Show Ambassador Show qualifier and the winner at Show Level then represents the Show at the Group Final.
- An ambassador having won at their Local Show Level is not eligible to enter any other Show or represent another group.
- The winner of the Group Final then represents the Group at the State Final, which is held at the annual VAS Convention.
- Each Finalist will be judged based on the criteria below.
- At the State Final the Finalists will need to provide a cover letter and resume that will be given to the judges.
- Each Finalist will be interviewed by a panel of three judges and the winner will be announced at the Convention Dinner.

Judging Criteria

- Local Show Involvement (15 Points) – Entrants must demonstrate an active involvement and a desire to be involved in the future and improvement of their Local Show Society.
- Community Involvement (10 Points) - Entrants must demonstrate an active involvement and a desire to be involved in the future and improvement of their Local Community.

REGULATIONS

1. All sheep shown must be shorn between 1st July and the 30th November of the previous year and should have no more than twelve months' growth or less than 5 cm (2ins.) of growth.
2. Ovine Brucellosis. All rams exhibited over 6 months of age, must be from an accredited free flock. Or have a current veterinary certificate proving negative to manual examination and blood test.
3. No sheep will be allowed to compete if infected with foot rot or an external parasite.
4. Owners or handlers must remain with sheep until the completion of judging.
5. The onus is on the exhibitor to ensure sheep are entered in the correct section otherwise they may be disqualified.
6. All classes will be judged on soundness, conformation and suitability of fleece.
7. All exhibitors will be asked to complete a health status form in relation to Johne 's disease

1. Exhibitors having won in classes Fine, Medium, and Strong wool sections at show level will be eligible for the Group Final. The same fleece must be used in all 3 levels (Show, Group, & State) of the competition.
2. Class winners and runners up of each class of the Group Final will be eligible for the State Final.
3. Each Show/Group is responsible to arrange with the exhibitor methods of delivery and collection of fleeces at Group & State Final. If assistance is needed with this please contact VASLtd office
4. All fleeces to be returned to the owner at the completion of the State Final
5. All fleeces will be judged as per the current recommendations set out by the National Council of Wool Selling brokers of Australia.
6. An exhibitor is only eligible to represent one Group in the State Final in each class.
7. Each fleece entered must be a bona fide product of the exhibitor.
8. If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group or State Final level, then the second placegetter is eligible to complete.
9. Entrant details of each winning class from Show Level must be submitted to the respective Group Secretary; Group Secretaries will provide each class winner and runner up details to the VAS Office, which will contact each winner and runner up regarding the State Final.
10. An appointed judge for the State Final will be selected by Australian Wool Network and VAS Ltd Livestock & Agricultural Competition Committee.

State Final Prizes for Each Category (Fine, Medium & Strong)

First: \$100.00 & VAS State final Trophy

Second: \$75.00 prizemoney

Third: \$50.00 prizemoney

VAS RICH FRUIT CAKE COMPETITION (MA 1)

The following recipe is compulsory for all entrants.

Ingredients:

250 g sultanas, 250g chopped raisins, 250 g currants,
 125g chopped mixed peel, 90g chopped red glace cherries,
 90g chopped blanched almonds, 1/3 cup sherry or brandy,
 250g plain flour, 60g self-raising flour, 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg,
 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger, 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves,
 250g butter, 250 g soft brown sugar,
 1/2 teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind,
 1/2 teaspoon almond essence, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence,
 4 large eggs

Method:

Cut the fruit and almond into 3 or 4 pieces. Mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least one hour, but preferably overnight. Sift together flours and spices. Cream butter and sugar with the essence. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon. Place the mixture into a prepared 20 cm square, straight sided, square cornered tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3 1/2 - 4 hours. Allow to cool in tin.

Note: To ensure uniformity in size it is recommended that raisins be snipped.

BOILED FRUIT CAKE - Class MA 39 & MA 46

Ingredients:

125g butter	250g sugar
1 cup cold water	1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon mixed spice	125g currants
275g sultanas	250g raisins
60g mixed peel	1 tablespoon lemon juice

Combine above ingredients in a saucepan and bring to the boil stirring well, simmer for 3 minutes. Allow to become cold. Beat 2 eggs then add to cooled mixture, and then add 125g SR flour and 185g plain flour. Mix well. Then add 1 dessertspoon golden syrup. Lastly add 1/2 level teaspoon bi-carb soda dissolved in 1 tablespoon boiling water. Mix well and place in a lined 20cm cake tin. Bake in moderate to slow oven for about 2 hours.

VAS CARROT CAKE (MA 2)

Ingredients:

- 375 g Plain Flour
- 2 tsp Baking Powder
- 1 1/2 tsp bicarb soda
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp ground nutmeg
- 1/2 tsp allspice
- 2 tsp salt
- 345 g castor sugar
- 375 ml vegetable oil
- 4 eggs
- 3 medium carrots, grated (350 grams)
- 220 g tin crushed pineapple, drained
- 180 g pecan nuts crushed

Method

1. Preheat the oven to 180C (160C fan), Grease a 23cm (9") round cake tin and line with baking paper.
2. Sift the dry ingredients together into a bowl. In a separate bowl, beat the eggs and oil, then add to the dry ingredients. Mix well then add the carrots, crushed pineapple and pecans. Mix to form a smooth batter and pour into the cake in.
3. Bake for approximately 90 - 100 minutes.
4. Remove from the oven and allow to cool for 10 minutes in the tin on a wire rack. Upend and allow to cool on the wire rack.

Ingredients:

1 cup One minute oats	125 gms Butter
1 cup sugar	1 cup SR flour
1 cup Desiccated Coconut	1 Tbspn Golden Syrup

Mix together all above dry ingredients. Melt together butter, golden syrup, then add bi carb soda which has been dissolved in boiling water. Add to dry ingredients and mix to a firm consistency.

Place teaspoons full of mixture on well greased baking tray (or use baking paper to line tray), leaving room to spread. Bake in moderate oven till brown - Cool on tray.

VAS JUNIOR BOILED FRUIT CAKE RECIPE (MB 2)

Ingredients:

375g Mixed Fruit	3/4 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon mixed spice	1/2 cup water
125g butter	1/2 teaspoon bicarbonate soda
1/2 cup sherry	2 eggs, lightly beaten
2 tablespoons marmalade	1 cup self-raising flour
1 cup plain flour	1/4 teaspoon salt

Method:

1. Place the mixed fruit, sugar, spice, water and butter in a large saucepan and bring to the boil
2. Simmer gently for 3 minutes, then remove from stove, add the bi carb and allow to cool,
3. Add the sherry, eggs and marmalade, mixing well
4. Fold in the sifted dry ingredients then place in a greased and lined 20cm round cake tin
5. Bake in a moderately slow oven for 1½ hours or until cooked when tested

VAS CARROT & DATE MUFFINS RECIPE (MB 1)

Ingredients:

2½ cups S R Flour	1 Tablsprn orange marmalade
1 teas ground cinnamon	1 cup canola oil
1/4 teas ground nutmeg	2 eggs lightly beaten
1 cup brown sugar (firmly packed)	¾ cup orange juice
1/3 cup chopped pitted dates	1 cup reduced fat milk
1 cup coarsely grated carrots	

Method:

1. Heat oven to 190° C (moderately Hot)
2. Line a 12 hole muffin pan with Round Paper Muffin Cases. Classic White Muffin Cases Size 35mm height x 90mm wide x 50mm base.
3. Sift dry ingredients into a large bowl; stir in dates, carrots. Then add the combined marmalade, oil, eggs, juice & milk. Mix until just combined.
4. Spoon mixture evenly into prepared pan cases in muffin pan
5. Cook for 20 minutes, (to test muffins are cooked insert cake skewer - if it comes out clean muffins are ready)
6. Stand Muffins In pan for 5 minutes before removing to cool



NDAS JUNIOR CHOCOLATE CAKE RECIPE (MB 4)

INGREDIENTS:

1 cup SR Flour, 1 cup castor sugar, 2 eggs, 1 teas vanilla, ½ cup milk,
3 Tablespoons cocoa, 125gm butter melted, pinch salt.

Method:

Line and grease 20cm round cake tin. Preheat oven to 180c.

Place clean tea towel on a cake cooling rack

(this prevents rack marks on the cake).

Whisk eggs slightly, add milk and vanilla and set aside.

Sift SR Flour, salt and cocoa together, add castor sugar, mixing together.

Add egg mixture and melted butter and with a whisk mix well.

Pour mixture into prepared tin.

Place in preheated oven for 35 minutes, or until cooked

when tested with a fine skewer.

Remove from oven, let stand for five (5) minutes.

Turn out onto tea towel covered cooling rack to cool.
